

The Home of the Holy Angels to Build Clinic.

Winter Park, FL - Fr. Charles Nabwana, president of KUDU, Inc. announced plans to design and build a community clinic for his school, The Home of the Holy Angels to serve Kibale, Uganda, a community ravaged by the AIDS/HIV virus.

The orphanage is located in a remote district in one of the poorest countries in Africa and has suffered tremendously from the AIDS/HIV epidemic in a country known for its history of political unrest.

"The children at The Home of the Holy Angels are orphaned due to the AIDS/HIV virus," explained Fr. Charles. "These little angels come from homes where the primary caretaker is either a grandparent or an aging foster parent from an extended family. The disease has almost eliminated the middle generation of the country's population. There currently is no clinic in Kibale to provide even the most basic health care. The nearest medical facility is located six miles distant. Treatment there means a long walk for the children. Emergency care is out of the question."

Fr. Charles has assembled a well-qualified team of Orlando's experts to help successfully deliver the clinic to his angels.

Dr. John Langdon of Winter Park will serve as the clinic's medical consultant. Dr. Langdon is a compassionate physician associated with the University of Central Florida and Florida Hospital who has made numerous medical mission trips to the Dominican Republic and Haiti to give of his time and talents to provide medical care to the needy. Through these mission trips, Dr. Langdon has gained insight into building clinics for people in needy communities. His research is the basis for the clinic project in Uganda. His full-service clinic will contain a pediatric care unit for the children, education and nursing facilities for public health issues, and a family care plan for the village.

The design and functionality of the clinic will be the responsibility of Carlos Marcet. Mr. Marcet is Senior Vice President and Director of Healthcare Design with the firm of Helman-Hurley-Charvat-Peacock/Architects, Inc. (HHCP), Orlando, FL. He brings an extensive professional background with over 30 years experience primarily focused on planning, design, and project management of health care facilities.

Tom Acomb, of Acomb/Ostendorf and Associates, Inc, Orlando, will provide additional design expertise for the clinic. Mr. Acomb has been the lead project manager for numerous projects in major entertainment projects worldwide. Upon his graduation from the University of Cincinnati, Mr. Acomb joined Walt Disney Imagineering, the storied creative division at Walt Disney World, Inc. and soon became Senior Leader for many of their projects worldwide. He has lead the concept and feasibility for a spectrum of projects that ranged from luxury resorts on the west coast to adventure theme parks in the northeast.

Mark Hefferin, Senior Vice President of Cambridge-US Development will provide construction consultation for the clinic. Mr. Hefferin has been in the design/construction industry for over 30 years. He previously served as vice president of operations for a large construction company holding key executive management roles in the life sciences, pharmaceuticals, food and beverage, manufacturing, hospitality and higher education institutional markets.

The Home of the Holy Angels is staffed by professionally trained educators and matrons, members of religious orders who are under the direction of Father Charles Nabwana. Fr. Nabwana was born and raised in the locale and has dedicated his life to enriching his community, both physically and spiritually.

Plans are already in place to host post-graduate, practicing nurses and doctors from US-based colleges and universities to help the youth and their families explore solutions to the HIV/AIDS crisis.

An acronym for the Kibale Uganda Development Union, Inc., KUDU provides the nurturing environment for success in Kibale, Uganda at The Home of The Holy Angels, a very important mission half a world away. The childrens' tuition and room and board is underwritten entirely by a well-engineered sponsorship program. One hundred-percent of the funds raised go toward the care of the children.

KUDU, Inc. is a 501-c-3 non-profit, chartered in Winter Park, FL to support The Home of the Holy Angels in Kibale, Uganda. It began with a 20-acre campus purchased by an anonymous donor in Winter Park and donated to Fr. Charles to care for the orphans.
